In the space of 10 years Martha Trust has grown tremendously. Here our chairman, Humphrey Clarke, reflects on our small beginnings, our rapid growth at Hacklinge and the imminent build of our new Hastings home.

ver since I became a trustee of Martha Trust there seems to have been construction work on the Hacklinge site, preparation for it, or clearing up afterwards.

I recall it started with the need to enlarge one room in Martha House to meet a new regulation and enable us to take a very young new resident. Next came the extension of the house to provide additional adult spaces. Suddenly there was the need to build the children's home, Frances House, to comply with a change in regulations compelling us to separate children from adults. In a flurry of action we sped, with local and Naval assistance, to create the new garden. Barely pausing for breath, we created the new wing of Martha House to enlarge and improve the lounge area and to bring the décor upto the standard of Frances House.

It appeared the construction industry had taken root in Hacklinge until suddenly there has been an unusual hush; no builders, no cement mixers, just Mike carrying out routine maintenance.

AND NOW THE DUST HAS SETTLED

It must be bliss for staff and residents to have the place to themselves after the ordered chaos of building and decorating. The results have been wonderful but we know they were hard to live through.

I want to take this opportunity of saying thank you to all the staff and residents for putting up with all this with so little complaint. I hope you now find it as

We concluded at the time that although we do not have a perfect organisation or facilities we have enough so that we can be a blessing to many other families and residents - but how to achieve that?

We prayed and pushed on several doors and suddenly this one opened. The hinges creaked at times but now we are moving forward and are excited at the opportunity it brings. We know it will create challenges as we increase the size of the organisation by around 40 per cent - but that also raises the numbers of individuals and families we are able to help.

LOOKING AHEAD TO HASTINGS

Hastings is not the only new opening. We have also been presented with some other opportunities but at this moment we're concentrating on reorganising ourselves to better manage the existing homes in Hacklinge while providing proper support to, and control of, the new Hastings home. May I reassure the staff, parents and carers that we are determined not to grow any faster than we can provide proper support to existing staff and residents. You, our residents and visitors, are more important to us than just the size of the organisation.

WELL DESERVED THANKS

May I take this opportunity of saying thank you to all of you who support us with prayers, with funds and by generally making people aware of our work. We are immensely grateful to you and without you we could not make such a difference to the lives of so many families.

Please keep doing what you are doing, you really are making a huge difference to a group of people who in many cases were in desperation before we were able to offer them help.
